Adults must say a word for you to spell by jumping from letter to letter. This could also be done on paper inside the house. Weekly Writing Tasks

Monday- Listen to the poem to 'Royal Tea' by Benjamin Zepheniah. Discuss it with your grown up, were there any words phrases that stood out? How did it make you feel? Discuss the parts you liked and disliked. Create a list of questions you would ask Benjamin Zephaniah. Remember when writing question sentences you will need? to punctuate. Some question words that might help:

How/ What/ Why/ When/ Do/ Did/

Weekly Maths Tasks- Adding

Monday- Write all of the number facts (number bonds/hearts in love) up to 20 e.g. 3 + 17 = 20, 17 + 3 = 20. Also write the inverse e.g. 20 - 3 = 17. Write all the number facts to 100 using only the multiples of 10 e.g. 10 + 90 = 100. Represent some of your number facts in picture form too using 'ten sticks and one dots' or drawing numicon shapes.

Tuesday- You are going to write your own Royal adventure story. Today will be all about planning. You might want to start with a mindmap to jot down all your ideas before deciding on your set plan. Draw your main character (king, queen, servant, prince, princess, dragon, knight) and make notes around them using words or simple phrases, do the same with your setting. Plan the beginning middle and end of your story. Here are some pointers:

Beginning- introduce character and setting through description Middle- an event/ catastrophe occurs (there might be a villain) End- Consequences/ conclusion (happy or sad ending)

You may want to plan your story through story mapping using pictures and actions to help you retell the story. We have used this many times at school; it helps to order events and makes it easy to tell the story orally.

Tuesday- Practise counting in 2s, 5s, 3s and 10s. Create your own board game where




the landing spaces have multiplication number sentences to answer. Or write the multiple down (the answer) on the landing space. You will need to say the answer before you are allowed to take your next turn. Let's see if you can beat your grown ups!

Wednesday- Write your own Royal adventure story using your plan. Try to incorporate elements we use in school such as sentence stretching, phrase repetition and power of 3. Use inverted commas when using dialogue. You could spend time creating your own book with pictures on each page. There are many stories that might inspire you such as:


Zog / The Kiss That Missed/ The Littlest Dragon/ The Bravest Knight/ Dragons Love Tacos/ The Queen's Hat/ The Queen's Knickers/ Not Your Typical Dragon

Wednesday- Choose a number between 10 and 50. How many different ways can this number be partitioned?



Thursday- Once you have finished writing your fantastic Royal adventure story create a front cover and blurb for it. You might also like to create a comic strip version for your story. Can you write a review or a list of reasons why you think Miss Hilton will like it/ should read it? Perhaps you could record yourself reading it or upload pictures of your writing/ front cover/ comic strip to twitter.

Thursday- Have a go at some division number sentences. Use real objects or pictures to help you 'share' the quantities out into equal groups. Try dividing by 2 / 3 / 4 / 5 groups. Here are some to get you started, then have a go at your own. Remember to



write in a number sentence using the correct symbol. Double check your answers to make sure every group is equal after sharing/dividing. The next step from this is using a 100 square of number line showing equal jumps/groups.

Friday- Visit the Literacy Shed for this wonderful resource on <u>The Clocktower</u>. Or write a setting description of Buckingham Palace using this image.



Friday- In Benjamin Zephaniah's poem 'Royal Tea' he tells the reader that he paid £8.50 to visit Buckingham Palace. Look at real money and draw pictures of coins and notes. What coins could he have used to pay for his ticket? How many different ways can you represent this amount including using a note? If he paid with a £10 how much change would he receive?

Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about famous or significant people. Learning may focus on past or present inventors, explorers or scientists and how they influence society today.

- How Important is Mary Seacole?- Mary Seacole was a Jamaican-born nurse who is remembered for helping soldiers during the Crimean War just like Florence Nightingale. Using this video create a simple timeline of Mary Seacole's life. If this is too challenging, why not design an award for Mary Seacole or create a drawing or painting of her.
- **Keep them Clean!-** Mary Seacole visited Florence Nightingale, another important nurse, during the Crimean War. Florence Nightingale was known for highlighting the importance of hygiene when caring for the sick, including cleaning the hospital and washing hand. Create a poster all about washing your hands. Try to include catchy slogans/ titles, bright pictures and maybe some facts you have found online. Design your own hand soap; draw a picture of what it would look like, add adjectives to describe it and maybe even add a price too!
- Intriguing Inventions- Become an inventor! Perhaps a new gadget for the home to keep the family entertained, or something that would help a doctor or a nurse. Draw and label their design and write about what it is for. Have a go at making it using things from the recycling box, this could be a fun family project to do together/
- The Queen: Then and Now- What was life like for Queen Elizabeth I? This video may help although you can probably remember lots about her from school (Beech love History topics!) How is life different for the current queen, Queen Elizabeth II? Create a list of the similarities and differences. You might focus on appearance, family and interests. You could even show this using illustrations too on paper of on Purple Mash.
- A Seriously Significant Somebody- Who is important to you? What makes them so important? Draw or paint a portrait, make a 3D model or collage of your significant somebody.
